Last week I had the pleasure of meeting with every teacher around their Performance and Development. Many of our teachers are exploring language and strategies of feedback as well as including our learners in their assessment so that they know and own where they are at as learners. Our learners have responded very well to the modified strategies and we look forward to our survey results in our second cycle later in the year.

Again, we realise that this is a challenging and restrictive time. It may be an opportunity for families to explore the Parent Hub of the Resilience Project. Our learners have all been encouraged to practice their G.E.M practices while remote schooling occurs.



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### **Junior School Team**

Wow another week done, time sure is flying. We are more than halfway through the term and our learners are smashing their goals.

We have had another wonderful week in Year 1 with all learners striving to achieve their best! In reading we are continuing to work on our expression to make our reading exciting to listen to. In Writing, we are working on our persuasive pieces which we have explored through the fantastic text 'I Wanna Iguana.' In Inquiry, we have been loving learning about the significant people in Australia's history like Steve Irwin and Cathy Freeman! We are feeling super proud of the learning we are doing at the moment - superstars!

The Preps are stars! We have been achieving great success! Our narratives are sensational and we are really starting to view ourselves as authors. We are coming to an end to our learning in addition and are excited to begin subtraction. Inquiry is buzzing and we are really enjoying learning about significant Australians. Stop a prep and test their knowledge on Ned Kelly, Captain Cook, Steve Irwin or Cathy Freeman. You won't be disappointed!!

In the 2/3 room we focused on researching information to create multiple information texts. We explored the 'Blood Moon' with Miss Toll on Thursday and researched facts and details to write an information report. In Reading, we continued to practise our fluency. We also learned to use a dictionary to expand our vocabulary and to use this when we are stuck on the meaning of a word.

#### **Senior School Team**

We are halfway through the term. Time is just flying for our learners.

We welcomed two new learners into the Yr <sup>5</sup>/<sub>6</sub> learning space last Monday. Indi McInnes in Yr 6 and Ryder Cameron in Yr 5. All learners were very welcoming and supportive to our new learners.

We began the week with shared reading which focused on Aboriginal culture. We learned about their country, language and what 'Dreaming' is. Learners were able to make connections to some Dreamtime stories they have heard. Learners looked at an Australian history timeline that dates back to the 1600's. Learners explored some of the significant events as to history during a particular time. They enjoyed looking at all the different events and even the more recent ones as well.

Learners are continuing to research their Inquiry investigation on their selected topic. They are planning what their final product will be and how they are going to step it up. Learners are using a variety of resources to gather their information from websites to books. It is wonderful to see learners taking control of their own learning and sharing with their peers what they have learned so far.

Learners are continuing to write persuasive pieces of writing using the hamburger or OREO structure to support them. They are writing about topics that are meaningful to them and that they can relate to. Learners need to make sure they have evidence to back their arguments.

Some learners have begun the Sacramental Program and all learners will participate in some of the activities as well. It is great to see all the learners learning about the different Sacraments and for the Sacramental learners to share their journey with their peers.

## Playing our part to build a national picture of child health

In early 2021, our school, along with thousands of others across the country will begin preparations for the fifth Australian Early Development Census (AEDC).

The AEDC gives us a national picture of the development, health and wellbeing of children in their first year of full-time school. Since 2009, the census results have helped communities, schools and governments plan services and develop better policies to target support for children and families.

Children don't miss any class time, and parents/carers don't need to supply schools with any new information for the census. The AEDC gives us data at a school and community level - it isn't an assessment of individual children.

Some teachers have also noticed that completing the assessments made them more aware of the needs of individual children and the class as a whole and that the census results are useful in planning for transitions to Year 1 and developing class programs.

Participation in the AEDC is voluntary. Parents/carers don't need to take any action unless they choose not to include their children in the census.
