#### **Greetings St Mary's families!**

#### Beginning of year school mass and community BBQ

Thank you to the families and parishioners who gathered with us on Thursday to celebrate the beginning of our school year.

It was wonderful to see our year 6 students begin their final year of school by supporting our Foundation students as the begin their first year of school. Father Minh shared the gospel with us ~ Luke 6 ~ "*Treat others as you would like them to treat you*" and the clear message from his homily was to remember that if you show love and kindness to others, this is how they will treat you. I think that if we remember this phrase throughout 2025, this will make a positive impact on every interaction we have with each other. For students, this will be evident in the empathy, kindness, respect and inclusion they show each other and families can model the behavior they wish to see in their children.

Demonstrating empathy, respect, and kindness at home sets a strong example of positive ways we can treat others. This year, lets build on our supportive and respectful environment where the message of treating others as you wish to be treated is lived out daily. Let's focus on building a culture of empathy, respect, and kindness, starting with how we treat each other every day.



#### **Shrove Tuesday**

This day marks the last day of 'ordinary time' in our church calendar before the season of Lent begins - a period of forty days where Christians traditionally fast or give up certain foods, choose to pray more or to provide 'alms' to others. The forty days represent the time that Jesus spent fasting in the desert where he resisted temptation.



On Shrove Tuesday, Catholics traditionally empty their homes of rich and luxurious foods such as eggs, milk and flour – everything that makes a good pancake! In the past, these foods were eaten to avoid wastage in anticipation of the fasting period of Lent. The word *shrove* comes from shrive, meaning to present oneself for confession, penance, and absolution. In class, students have reflected on the 3 acts of Lent and have made a Lenten promise that we will burn and mix with the ashes from last years' palms and use on Ash Wednesday as a symbol of our Lenten journey.

We will be eating pancakes at school to launch Project compassion ~ a Caritas fundraiser where we can make a difference in lives of people in our country and overseas. Students are asked to bring a gold coin donation to put in the Project Compassion box at school.

#### **Ash Wednesday**

Ash Wednesday marks the start of the Lenten period leading up to Easter, when Christians believe Jesus died and was resurrected. Ash Wednesday is a solemn reminder of human mortality and the need for reconciliation with God. It is commonly observed with the distribution of ashes.



We will be joining the Ash Wednesday mass at the church at 12pm, and warmly welcome families to join us.

#### **Project Compassion ~ Caritas Fundraiser**

During Lent, we are asked to pray - fast - provide alms (almsgiving). This year during Lent, our school will be supporting Caritas through the 'Big Water Walk'. When students and their family arrive at school on Friday morning, they can join the staff in walking laps of our oval. Students and families will be able to donate coins they have saved during the week into their class Project Compassion box and in the last week we will count each box. The class who raises the most will receive a prize!

#### **Easter raffle**

As the main fundraiser for Project Compassion, we are asking for donations for an Easter egg raffle - soon students will bring home raffle tickets to sell to family and friends. Tickets will be \$1 each. The more donations we receive, the more prizes we can offer. Donations can include chocolate, Easter craft, Easter books etc. We will be asking parents to help assemble the prizes. If you would like to help, please email Lauren.

#### **Easter bonnet parade**

In the last week of school, we will be having our annual Easter bonnet parade. Students and families can create a hat/bonnet to wear and dress up! On this day, we will draw the raffle winners.

#### **CSEF, SCHOOL SAVING BONUS & FEE CONCESSION**

If you hold a current Health Care Card or Pension Concession Card please make sure that you complete the CSEF application form which was sent home with fee statements on Friday.

This year, concession card holders will receive: -

- CSEF funding of \$150 per student;
- · Government School Savings Bonus of \$400 per student;
- and a School Fee Concession rebate from Catholic Education Sandhurst Limited which will mean eligible parents will only have to pay \$520 per child for this year's fees.

This equates to \$10 per week per child. To be eligible to receive the Fee Concession rate parents will be required to guarantee to pay the \$10 weekly payment per child (this can be set up using our Direct Debits plan, Centrepay, paying directly into the school bank, or paying in one lump sum). Once the CSEF form is received by the school a Fee Concession application form will be sent home for parents to complete and return to school.

Our staff can also help veterans and their families connect to the Department of Veterans' Affairs

Wi-Fi is available for visitors to the MSC and staff will be able to help you create a myGov account. myGov is a simple and secure way to access government services online.

Our staff provide you with friendly face-to-face service, information and support. From time to time, representatives from other government agencies also travel with the MSCs.

#### E-scooter Road Rules

Tougher penalties as e-scooters are made permanent.



#### e-scooter riders cannot

- Ride on the footpath
- Use a mobile phone while riding
- Ride while under the influence of drugs or alcohol
- Carry passengers or animals or ride in tandem
- Ride a high-speed e-scooter, one capable of more than 25 km/h
- Ride on roads that have a speed limit over 60 km/h

### e-scooter riders must

- Be aged 16 years and over
- Not exceed the maximum speed of 20 km/b
- Ride only on shared paths and roads that have a speed limit up to 60 km/h
- Wear a helmet at all times
- Follow traffic rules
- Use lights and reflectors
